

Spring Term – Second Half 2023



Lent is a really important time for Christians.

Lent is represented by the colour purple which is worn by priests and seen on the altar at Mass. Purple, like the season of Lent, symbolises a time of prayer, penance and preparation for Jesus' death on the cross and His Resurrection at Easter. It offers a chance for us to reflect on our relationship with God and make a fresh start as the Church focuses on the three pillars of Lent, almsgiving, fasting and prayer – or as children in school will know them, GIVE, GROW, PRAY.

On the fourth Sunday of Lent, called Laetare Sunday, we were invited to celebrate! 'Laetare' is the Latin word for 'rejoice' and on this day, the purple of Lent was swapped for rose pink, symbolising hope and a reminder of what is to come on Easter Sunday.

This coming Sunday, 'Palm Sunday' will see the purple of Lent being swapped to that of red. The colour red symbolizes the passion of Christ and the blood He shed upon the cross. During Holy Week, the colour red is also used on Good Friday.

Pupil Chaplains launched the Lenten theme of 'Pray, Grow and Give' to encourage children and their families to grow closer to God through their thoughts, words and actions during the season of Lent.

Pray

Children were encouraged to make their prayer life richer and more focussed by praying more frequently.

Grow

Children were encouraged to help others with acts of kindness and service at home, school and in the community.

Give

Through a fundraiser organised by Pupil Chaplains and the sports committee, children from each class were asked to get sponsored to jog every day for five minutes.

The money raised from the sponsorship will be donated to DEC to support our brothers and sisters in Turkey and Syria who have been affected by earthquakes.

Gospel Assemblies



In the Gospel assemblies throughout Lent the children listened to the Gospels which focussed on the Lent theme of 'Pray Grow and Give'.

In addition, children were encouraged to link our school values to the Gospel message.

'Jesus, Be My Path'

Matthew 4:1-11:

The Gospel assembly in the week of 27th February shows Jesus in the wilderness, resisting temptation and putting God's way above all things. Through a range of scenarios involving resisting temptation and making good choices, this assembly helped children learn that it is important to make the right choice and sometimes making the right choice can be really difficult. We should trust in Jesus to be our path and the Holy Spirit to be our guide, leading us to God the Father.

During the assembly we discussed how Jesus resisted temptation. We discovered and shared that Jesus trusted God to give Him what He needed, and to look after Him.

We then related this question to our own lives What should we do when we are tempted to do things we know are wrong?

Again, we discovered and shared that Like Jesus, we can ask the Holy Spirit to help us make good choices.

The liturgies and Mass towards the end of term prepared us for what happened to Jesus in His final week on earth.

We linked these events to the celebration of Mass today.

In addition, we discussed that countries have different ways of remembering and celebrating the events of Holy Week.

There will be a special assembly when we return to school after Easter where children can share in assembly how Holy Week and Easter is celebrated in their country.

Prayer



A prayer that you might like to use in family prayer times during Lent is below. It includes the Lenten practices **GIVE, GROW, and PRAY** and encourages us to remember to place Jesus at the centre of all we say and do:

Jesus,

Be the centre.

As I continue my journey through Lent,


I welcome you into my heart.

Holy Week

Through Holy Week we learn of Jesus' ultimate sacrifice- Jesus died for us so that we can have a new life following His example.

Holy Week starts with **Palm Sunday**, when Jesus is welcomed triumphantly into His own holy city of Jerusalem. But while this is a triumphal entry, it is Jesus' first step toward His death when Jesus began His journey towards the cross.

Later in the week, **Maundy Thursday** marks the beginning of the Easter Triduum (the three holy days) and when the disciples shared the Last Supper. That night we remember Jesus in agony in the garden and we try and spend some prayer time keeping Him company.

Then follows His betrayal, arrest and cruel trials which continue into **Good Friday**: Jesus' final passion and death on the Cross. **Holy Saturday** is the quiet day of the three holy days.

Then there is the climax of joy, as the Church celebrates Jesus' resurrection from the dead on Easter Sunday!

Jesus' resurrection shows us that He is truly the Son of God.

Maybe in the midst of our busy lives, the real meaning of Easter may get missed.

As a family can you go to church during Holy week and pray together more regularly?

Bless you, Lord, for shining your light upon me, and for sending your son to us.

Here I stand, at the start of this Holy Week, this week in which we remember Jesus' passion and death. Sometimes I am distracted by many things. Help me to recognise what is important.

Ask your child/ren how the school has been focusing on Lent and self-giving.


Parents' Prayer Club
