



## Textiles - Pouches

<b>Accurate</b>	Neat, correct shape, size and pattern with no mistakes.
<b>Fabric</b>	A natural or man-made woven or knitted material that is made from plant fibres, animal fur or synthetic material.
<b>Knot</b>	A join made by tying two pieces of string or rope together.
<b>Pouch</b>	A small bag made to keep objects safe and to be carried easily.
<b>Running-stitch</b>	A simple style of sewing in a straight line with no overlapping.
<b>Sew</b>	To join or fasten by stitches made using a needle and thread.
<b>Shape</b>	The form of an object.
<b>Stencil</b>	A shape that you can draw around.
<b>Template</b>	A stencil which you use to help you draw a shape more easily on to different materials.
<b>Thimble</b>	A small metal cap to cover and protect your finger when sewing.

### Knowledge and skills covered in this topic

- ❑ Children will know how to cut fabric neatly.

- ❑ Children will know how to apply fabric glue for joining fabric.
- ❑ Children will know how to decorate using a range of materials.

### Prior knowledge

**Year 1:** Joining two pieces of fabric by pinning, staples or gluing.


Remember to plan where your stitches will go on the pouch **template**.



When cutting the **template** out, be careful and as **accurate** as possible.
