Knowledge/Scripture/Liturgy

The Christian community has many special places: places where people gather for prayer and worship; places are holy because of their association with Jesus or holy people; places of pilgrimage.

- Children will be able to **ask questions** about what they and others wonder about special places and realise that some of these questions are difficult to answer.
- ☐ Through Scripture the children will **retell and identify** the stories about places that were
 special to Jesus with particular reference to
 Bethlehem, The River Jordan and The Sermon
 on the Mount.
- ☐ Children will **research** sites of Christian
 Pilgrimage and Holy Places of worship and **describe** some ways in which religion is lived
 out by Christians; for example. by going on
 pilgrimage
- Through the work of CAFOD, children will explore and identify issues that are affecting and spoiling our world (e.g. climate change, pollution) and identify ways in which Christians can work together to keep the world a special place and put some of these ways into practice in their daily lives.
- ☐ Children will **celebrate** their new knowledge and understanding by planning, leading and delivering their own end of topic liturgy.
