Collective Worship

'The celebration of Catholic liturgies and prayers as an integral part of the learning and teaching should enable the school community to become reflective, experience the presence of God and should develop a mature spiritual life.' *Christ at the Centre Rev Marcus Stock, 2005*

At St Elizabeth's, through Collective Worship we acknowledge and celebrate the life-giving presence of the Trinity (Father, Son, Holy Spirit) in our lives. It is how we, as a community of faith, come together to give glory, honour, praise and thanks to God. It is through acts of shared Worship, prayer and liturgy, that the Catholic identity of our school is shaped and sustained.

At St Elizabeth's, sacramental aspects of the Church's liturgical life, especially the Eucharist and the sacrament of reconciliation, are intrinsically woven into the fabric of our identity. There is a schedule of liturgical events which includes planned for participation in Mass and other Eucharistic liturgies and the opportunity for our pupils to participate in the sacrament of reconciliation during the seasons of Advent and Lent.

Legal requirements

In accordance with the law for all maintained schools, at St Elizabeth's:

- we provide daily Collective Worship for all
- Acts of Collective Worship are not considered to be part of the allocation of curriculum time for Religious Education
- we recognise and respect that parents have the legal right to withdraw their children from Collective Worship
- Foundation governors have a statutory responsibility to preserve and develop the religious character of the school

Responsibility and oversight of Collective Worship

The governors and headteacher are responsible for ensuring that there are daily timetabled opportunities for whole school and class worship.

The governors ensure that:

- there is a named person, the RE leader, who is responsible for organising Collective Worship across the school;
- Collective Worship, in the form of prayer or liturgy, happens for all pupils daily
- all pupils are able to access the prayer and liturgy offered within the school day
- Collective Worship is well resourced, both in regard to content and the continued professional development of those planning and leading. This includes enabling pupils to plan and lead
- there is regular and comprehensive monitoring of Collective Worship which clearly demonstrates the impact on the school's Catholic mission

Principles of Collective Worship

At St Elizabeth's, Acts of Worship endeavour to:

- give praise and honour to God
- give pupils meaningful opportunities to engage in the Sacramental Life of the Church
- give pupils positive liturgical experiences, appropriate to their age, aptitude and family context in order to prepare them for the liturgical life of the Church.
- be of high quality, fundamental to the life of the school and its Catholic character

• be examples of good practice, which should enable pupils and students to develop skills so that they can prepare, organise and lead Worship.

Aims of Collective Worship

The ultimate aim of Collective Worship at St Elizabeth's is to provide the space and tools for our young people and our staff, within the context of the Catholic faith and traditions:

- to contemplate the mystery of God
- to develop an understanding of Salvation History through meaningful engagement with the Eucharist and the sacrament of Reconciliation
- to reflect on spiritual and moral issues
- to foster and nurture relationships
- to respond to and to celebrate life
- to experience a sense of belonging and to develop community
- to nurture a common ethos and shared set of values
- to enrich religious experience
- to grow in liturgical understanding and development
- to reinforce prayers which are part of the Catholic tradition
- to seek appropriate responses to the love of God
- to take time out 'to wonder at', 'to come to terms with' and 'to give worth to.'

Forms of Collective Worship

School Assemblies

The school gathers together at least three times each week for Collective Worship linked to the liturgical season, Sunday's Gospel, or other religious, PSHE or social justice themes. A variety of staff and groups of children lead assembly.

The staff use a range of resources, including Ten:Ten and Cafod in the preparation and delivery of these assemblies.

The assemblies follow a format which is familiar to the children with music, hymns, prayer and the lighting of a candle and staff attend the majority of assemblies.

The Collective Worship schedule is as follows: **Monday**: Deputy Head led assembly **Tuesday**: Headteacher led assembly **Wednesday**: Class led assembly or class based liturgy **Thursday**: Values assembly **Friday**: Hymn practice

Values Collective Worship

Each Thursday the whole school community comes together for a time of Collective Worship in which one of our school values in celebrated. During this assembly an example of how the value is or has been 'lived' is shared. Celebration of children 'living' our school values is acknowledged and celebrated during this assembly.

Class led assemblies

Twice a year each class prepares an assembly for the whole school based on their learning in their RE topic. The children are actively involved in the selection of readings and the writing of prayers. They also use drama, art and music to engage and communicate their message. Parents, carers and governors are invited to attend class assemblies.

Child Led Liturgy

- Each week, different children in each class prepare and lead their class in worship. The children contribute to the planning of their worship. The children choose scripture, write payers and choose hymns. The children are included and involved in the whole process of planning and delivery of the worship.
- At the end of each 'Come and See' topic the children in each class prepare a liturgy as part of the respond element and to share and celebrate their newfound learning. The children follow the format of: gather, Word, response, go forth
- Chaplains regularly lead act of worships to the whole school.
- Chaplains lead a 'Bible club' for Key Stage 1 each week.
- Chaplains support prayer and reflection within 'Prayer club' each week

Mass

Throughout the year we have the joy of celebrating the Sacrament of the Eucharist in school. The priests from our parishes come into school to celebrate Masses and work with the staff in the preparation of these.

Children help to prepare and lead the Mass through Altar Serving, reading and bringing up the gifts during Mass. On Holydays of Obligation we go to one of our parishes for Mass in the parish church.

A special choir 'Schola' which encompasses Year 5 and Year 6 children lead the singing. Parents, carers and governors are invited to join us for Mass in school.

Liturgies

Throughout the year, to mark important events in the Church's liturgical year, we hold special liturgies e.g. Reconciliation Service and Ash Wednesday Liturgy.

Carol Service

Each year, Key Stage Two children lead the school in a Carol Service. The story of the Nativity is retold through scripture and carols. Parents, carers, clergy and governors are invited to join us for this special time of worship.

Passion Play

Every Lent, Year 4 perform the Passion Play. The children re-enact the Passion and Resurrection of Christ through drama, scripture and music.

We are joined by parents, carers, governors and clergy for this special occasion in preparation for Easter.

Recording

Collective Worship is recorded:

- Through displays, collections of pupil's contributions, prayers, reflections, photographs etc.
- PowerPoint presentation
- In Spiritual Journals
- On class timetables

Monitoring and Evaluation

At least once a year, the school's provision of worship will be evaluated to consider whether it meets the needs of all pupils and whether pupils are making progress in acquiring skills and abilities in organising and leading worship. The views of pupils, parents and staff are gathered in RE and Catholic Life surveys. The RE leader analyses the feedback from the surveys and reports this to the Senior leadership Team, the governors and parents. Feedback from the surveys informs the RE School Action plan, leading to improvement in practice and provision.

Resources

Each class has their own Collective Worship box which contains: scripture, cloths, candles, artefacts, along with various resources to help the children become more independent in planning Collective Worship.

Chaplains

St Elizabeth's has a team of pupil chaplains, who play a vital role in supporting the Catholic Life of the school, promoting our values and providing opportunities for the pupils to engage in prayer and social justice initiatives.

The chaplains meet regularly with the staff team and formal minutes are kept. Through prayer and hard work, they promote the faith in school to children, staff and the community.

Chaplains contribute to the School's RE Action plan and help decide on which charities to support and the best way the charities can be supported.

Chaplains are fully involved of the selection and induction of new group of chaplains in the Summer term.

As this year is 'Year of The Word' chaplains will be thinking about all the different ways we can help celebrate, share and live scripture. They are also taking the lead in the 'Live Simply' award.

Prayer

School Approach

At St. Elizabeth's, we aim to help children value and respect the power of prayer. We encourage the children to pray by providing a prayer area in each classroom. Each area has a Bible, other books and objects that the children feel make the area a special place. We help the children to both create and experience an atmosphere that enhances prayer. This

involves the children both preparing themselves to pray and experiencing peace and tranquillity.

We also have a collective prayer space in the school hall where all children are encouraged to actively engage in prayer and reflection.

We help the children to understand and express themselves in prayer through liturgical movement. We regularly use movement for the Our Father which the whole school follows, and we have taught different classes other movements appropriate to particular festivals in the year.

We encourage children to say and write spontaneous prayers, using their own words and thoughts.

At St. Elizabeth's we want to be a praying community. We feel it is important to know 'formal' prayers of the church, which we may all pray together and which we all hear and say with the wider parish/family communities outside school.

We also value highly 'formal' prayers which have been written especially for children and which hold meaning for them. With these two aspects in mind we aim to teach particular prayers, increasing in complexity, as the children develop. A plan for the introduction of these prayers throughout the seven years of our school follows.

Our expectation is that we all pray collectively at school in the morning (class or school assembly), before and after lunch, and at the end of the school day. The prayer plan below indicates which prayers are particularly suitable for the different times of the day.

At St. Elizabeth's, however, prayer does not only mean 'formal' prayers. We hope to help each other to listen to God speaking to us, and to respond in our hearts and minds – in silence, while looking at a suitable picture, while listening to music etc. We also encourage prayer writing (by each individual in the school) in our own words – expressing and sharing with others the prayers created inside our own beings.

To become a praying community with the children, we must be praying adults. We acknowledge the importance of praying together as adults – at staff meetings, at staff Masses, at governors' meetings, and at parents' meetings.
