- How and why does the possessive article change according to gender?
- How are the histories of France and England intertwined?

Topic name / Year focus: Je m'exprime

In Year 5, children will learn to express their opinions, as well as describe themselves and their extended families with new vocabulary. They will begin to develop written and translation skills, paying attention to the difference between literal and everyday French. Pupils will learn about our historical ties with France since William the Conqueror and the Bayeux Tapestry.
